Meetings commence at 7.30 pm, and Visitors are always welcome.



2023 -- Queensland Touring Rallies

May Starting in Mackay, Monday 15th May 2023.

A three day hub rally around the Mackay region.

15th – 17th Tour **Mackay**

18th & 19th are free to pack up camp and travel to Ayr. Approx 300km

20th - 22nd Tour **Ayr**

23rd & 24th Free days to travel to Innisfail. Approx 350km

25th - 27th Tour **Innisfail** region.

Rally finishes after the day's activities Saturday 27th May 2023.

All rally routes are suitable for 1 & 2 cylinder vehicles, as the people mapping the area all have a single cylinder veteran car.

We would like to keep the rally simple, ie, bring your own everything. At this stage there are no organised meals. Everyone is welcome to do the whole rally or just part of it.

The Northern Tour Update

It's not long to go now until we all meet up in Mackay for the first leg of this great adventure.

Rally registration will be at the Andergrove Van Park on Sunday 14th in the afternoon, around a 4 o'clock Happy Hour.

At registration we shall collect money for the End Of Tour Dinner. Cost is \$40 per person for a choice of three mains, two sides and two desserts. Please bring cash.

There is a Courtesy Bus to ferry us to the venue and home again.

The start of each day will be the Andergrove Van Park where most of us are staying. We shall all assemble at 8.30am for an 8.45 briefing before a 9 o'clock start.

For the first day in Mackay, we need numbers of who would like to go through Greenmount Homestead. Cost is \$5 per person, payable at registration.

Griffith was designed by noted architect Walter Burley Griffin in the early 20th century as part of the Murrumbidgee Irrigation Scheme, European migrants settled in the region after World War I and II and helped build a distinctive food and wine culture. The first vineyard was established in 1912 just outside Griffith, and the area has developed into a successful wine making region. Some of the best-known wineries with cellar doors are De Bortoli Wines, home of the internationally acclaimed Noble One Botrytis Semillon, and Calabria Family Wines. In town, browse providores such as Riverina Grove and Bertoldo's Pasticceria for locally made delicacies and great coffee. Bertoldo's is an institution, a family bakery since 1952. From the irrigation scheme to wine making, explore the heritage of Griffith at two museums on the same picturesque grounds. The Griffith Italian Museum is in the Pioneer Park Museum, which spans over 30 historic buildings. For art lovers, the Griffith Regional Art Gallery has impressive collections.
