PRESIDENT'S REPORT FOR MARCH.



RACV 1 and 2 Cylinder Rally - Koondrook/Barham - Len and Fiona Kelly

VCCA Victoria holds their annual 1 and 2 Cylinder Rally in March every year and for 2025 it was held in the sleepy little Murray River border towns of Koondrook and Barham. Three Queensland cars (Brooks, Cleggs and Kelly's) had entered and were heading down to join the other 60 odd veteran cars and veteran bikes entered. But Cyclone Alfred decided to blow a few trees around and put the power out for 5 days at the Cleggs, leaving them no choice but to stay home. Brooks had a tree over their driveway blocking them from getting out but they are no quitters, and soon had Rob York around with his chainsaw allowing them to escape. We left on the Sunday and went straight down the Bruce Highway through Sydney and saw first hand the flooding on either side of the road for 500K south of Brisbane.

The weather was forecast for a Heatwave in Koondrook and they were not wrong. High 30 degree maximum temps the first 3 days and then a cool 23 degree maximum on the last day.

Registration was on the Thursday at Midday and then a 25K shakedown run along the Northern side of the Murray River and return. A visit and tour of the Arbuthnot sawmill was organised for groups to watch the

breaking down of the large Redgum trees native to the area. Then the Welcome night at the Golf Club where old friends met up again after some time.

Friday's run of just over 100K went out along the Southern side of the Murray River through the scenic route to Cohuna for morning tea and then on to Gunbower for lunch. A run one of the rally directors, Adam Auditori, has personally wanted to use for a veteran car run for many years. It had a 3K stretch of good dirt road at one section which on that day the council decided to re-form. After some quick negotiations, the grader driver left one side finished for us to use while he had smoko and then finished the job before our return after lunch.



At lunch we all had the opportunity to have free camel rides on one of the four camels supplied. After lunch it was back to Barham stopping at Waffles House for an ice cream to cool off. Another organised meal at the Golf Club finished of another great day.



Saturday's run of 110K started with about half the entrants in their veterans and the other half going modern. Today was going to be a bit hotter. Stopping at a roadside park at Caldwell we had cold watermelon and drinks for morning tea before setting off to Wakool for lunch at the air-conditioned community run hotel. No one was in a hurry, and all had an extra drink before leaving.



The run back into Barham went through some broad acre country that was feeling the effects of no rain for some time and the heat. A 15-minute Kayak paddle from the boat ramp and a swim in the Murray River finished the day's run and cooled everyone down. The Final Dinner at the Bowls Club saw some interesting dress as the theme for the night was "Op Shop – Dress to Impress".

Sunday morning dawned and you could feel the coolness in the air from the weather change. A scavenger hunt along the river started the morning off with a 20K run through farmland return to the Barham Hotel for a farewell B-B-Q lunch.

Next year's VCCA Vic 1 and 2 cylinder rally will be around the same time... hopefully around the same time as the National 1 and 2 cylinder at Temora allowing more people and cars to enjoy the blast of 1 and 2 cylinder rallying.

THE STORY OF THE 1913 TALBOT 15/20 MB - As related by Bob Trevan



The story of the 1913 Talbot 15/20 MB is more than just a tale of a car restored—it's a story of history, chance, and the delicate balance between preservation and private ownership. Sometimes, the fate of a rare vehicle hinges on a single decision, and once a deal is struck, there's no telling where that path will lead.



This particular Talbot was originally purchased by John Joseph (J.J.) Hayter, a respected landowner from Hayters Hill, between Bangalow and Byron Bay, NSW. A prominent cattle breeder and long-serving chairman of Norco Dairy Co-operative Ltd., Hayter had the means to order a high-quality British car to serve his large family (wife & 6 children). In late 1913, a Talbot rolling chassis was imported from England and fitted with a seven seater tourer body (complete with dicky seats), by Phizackerleys in Sydney.

J.J. Hayter's relentless dedication to the dairying industry and the broader community saw him crisscrossing the Far North Coast and beyond, juggling responsibilities as chairman of Norco Cooperative Ltd., a leader in numerous agricultural and cooperative organisations, and an advocate for rural development. His tireless work in attending countless meetings, overseeing dairy and cooperative reforms, and supporting local industries left him little choice but to own a reliable automobile—a necessity for a man whose influence and duties spanned an entire region, requiring constant travel in service of both his family, the properties and animals he cared for.

In the early 20th century, the journey from Bangalow to Armidale was a considerable undertaking, especially for a family ensuring

their children received a quality education. The Hayter family's 1913 Talbot played a pivotal role in this endeavour. J.J. Hayter frequently drove his son, Eric, from their home in Hayters Hill to Tenterfield, a journey of approximately 120 miles each way. At Tenterfield, Eric would board the train bound for Armidale, where he attended boarding school. These schools, such as The Armidale School, established in 1894, were renowned for immersing students in agricultural studies, equipping them with the latest knowledge to manage and innovate in rural farming practices, which were changing rapidly at the time.

The train service was the quickest way between Sydney and Brisbane, passing through Tenterfield and Armidale, was part of the Main North railway line, also known as the Great Northern Railway. Completed in 1888, this line was the original rail connection between Sydney and Brisbane, traversing the New England region.

To make the most of these lengthy trips, J.J. Hayter often offered rides to other passengers, effectively turning his Talbot into an informal taxi service. This not only provided company for the long drive but also helped offset the costs associated with such extensive travel. On return journeys, especially during school holidays when Eric was coming home, Hayter would pick up passengers to and from the train and drop them off at various points along the route back to Hayters Hill.

Through the years, the car worked hard on the farm and around the district, but after Eric left school, he took over responsibilities for part of the farm and had the Talbot converted into a utility. It was driven to a blacksmith in Bangalow, who removed the tourer body and replaced it with a practical workhorse setup for hauling stock and supplies. The discarded body was sold to a farmer near Murwillumbah, where it found a strange new life—as a veranda lounge.

When J.J. Hayter passed away in the late 1930's, eventually his farms and assets were auctioned, including the well-used Talbot. Among the bidders were two determined men, locked in a fierce contest—one was Jack Caisley, a photographer from Lismore, the other was the man who owned the tourer body and wanted to reunite it with the car.

Caisley won the bid, but the battle wasn't over. Neither man was willing to part with what the other needed. No compromise was reached, and each walked away, holding onto their half of the puzzle.

Determined to restore the Talbot, Caisley dismantled it at his place in Lismore, storing the rolling chassis in one shed while the small parts—nuts, bolts, and fittings—were carefully placed in open glass jars on shelves in another. But fate had other plans. Tragically a grass fire swept through his property, consuming the wooden shed and ignited the paint (required to finish the car) and filled the open jars with molten paint, obscuring the parts to unrecognisable blobs of debris. At that point disheartened, Caisley could see there was no way he could restore the vehicle and abandoned the project.

Enter Bob Trevan of Lismore, who eventually purchased what was left of the Talbot. Unfortunately, Bob mistook the jars of nuts and bolts for jars of burnt paint and discarded the lot except for one bolt. Luckily, this bolt could be identified by an expert in Brisbane who recognised the pitch and thread as being of the same as found on a present series Fiat Crawler Tractor. With the many bolts purchased, making the bolt seller a wealthier man, it allowed Bob to get on with assembly.

The search for the rest of the car led him to Murwillumbah, where the long-lost tourer body still sat on a farmer's veranda. Armed with photos of the rolling chassis and front seat now restored, Bob somehow convinced the farmer to give up his unusual lounge furniture.

After obtaining the rear bodywork, Bob could see the inner ironwork was missing for the frame and roof mounting. He needed the original ironwork to help complete the restoration. Through local knowledge of ironmongery from a veteran car enthusiasts he was advised that they were last seen on the inner side walls at the blacksmiths shop.

Through a bit of research, Bob tracked down the whereabouts of the blacksmith's shop in Bangalow, where the original conversion had taken place. But the shop itself was long gone—burned down, abandoned, and collapsed into the dirt.



Bob wasn't deterred. Arriving at the charred remains of the workshop, he examined the burn patterns, traced the outline of the old walls, and started digging. His persistence paid off. Beneath the ash and rubble, he uncovered the missing ironwork—door hinges, locks, and all.

Piece by piece, the Talbot came back together. By 1982, it was fully restored and back on the road, driven and enjoyed by Bob and his family. He always described the car as "bulletproof."

That same year, Bob's wife, Beth Trevan, drove the Talbot around the Lismore Showgrounds with Olympic and Commonwealth Games champion Tracey Wickham as her passenger, a moment that captured the car's triumphant return.

But the Talbot's journey wasn't over.

One day, John Hughes, a Veteran Car Club of Australia (NSW) member, contacted Bob with a remarkable offer. John had recently located and purchased the remains of a Ford Model K on a property near the Karuah River, (once owned by industrial magnate William Longworth). The





Ford Model K, an early six-cylinder luxury car, was an extraordinarily rare find with approximately 950–1,000 units produced (1906–1908), and word quickly spread. An American Ford collector even offered \$30,000 just for the engine—a staggering sum for a rusted-out relic. But John had another idea. Instead of selling it, he proposed a trade—Bob's 1913 Talbot for the Ford Model K remains.

Bob faced a difficult decision. One of these historic items was destined to leave Australia, and it was up to him to decide which. A lifelong Ford enthusiast, he knew the Model K was too rare to lose.

The deal was made. The Talbot was traded for the Model K's engine & rusted transmission fragments, (the front axle remained in spot ... as it was covered in oysters and still being used as a mooring buoy in the Karuah River).

John Hughes repainted the Talbot green and eventually sold it to the Ward Brothers collection in the UK. It has since changed hands twice and now belongs to Michael Edwards, who purchased it around 2015.

From a farm in Bangalow to a blacksmith's forge, from burned-out ruins to a veranda in Murwillumbah, and from a Lismore backyard to an English collection, the 1913 Talbot's journey has been one of survival, loss, and rediscovery.

Meanwhile, Bob's decision to trade it meant that a piece of Ford history remained in Australia, preserved against the tide of overseas collectors.

A remarkable fate for a remarkable car.
