In USA, Merv Kroll bought it In Brisbane, Peter Arnold collected it In Merv's shed I marvelled at it..... And then - Merv sold it!

THE 1917 RAUCH & LANG ELECTRIC

At the Busselton Rally, I was approached by a gentleman "of mature years" and the conversation went like this:

HIM: You're from Brisbane aren't you?

ME: More or less.

HIM: You might know Merv Kroll. ME: Yeah, he lives not far from me.

HIM: I bought my car off him.

ME, in absolute excitement: Not the Rauch and Lang?

And so I met Bill Dixon, found that the car is restored and received an invitation to visit him in Albany on the way home and view the completed project. I relayed my invitation to Peter Arnold who was equally interested so approached Bill and had our invitation "expanded".

When I first saw the Rauch and Lang in Merv's shed, I was amazed at its condition, its completeness – a genuine American "barn find". Even its rear-view mirror which extended, above the windscreen across the entire car, was complete. Admiring its quaint body style, I was reminded of Joyce having had a ride in a similar Detroit Electric at Gilltrap's Auto Museum on the Gold Coast many , many moon's ago. Very likely her host at the time was either our dearly departed member, George Gilltrap or member, Frank Muggeridge (who was "imported" from New Zealand, along with the Gilltrap collection).

Rauch and Lang began building electric cars in 1905. In 1916 they merged with the Baker Electric company and production declined. From 1919 onwards, they were sometimes listed as Raulangs and from 1922, that became their official name. They apparently petered out around 1928.

Back to our car: We arrived at Bill and Shirley Dixon's Albany residence on a wet W.A. afternoon. I parked the D-Max, gazed down the driveway and fell in love! There sat the Rauch and Lang in all its glory. In its shiny blue paint that seemed so appropriate, it brought to mind all those little English words – perky, cheeky, jaunty – a real Noddy car. It was wonderful to see what it had become; how it had been transformed from the dusty model in Merv's shed.

The Arnolds joined us in Bill's back yard and after a quick inspection, Bill asked would we like a ride. Would we ever! (For Pete and Linda it was a double thrill as only the day before they'd had their first ride in a modern electric vehicle.). Joyce and I went off first, I sitting beside Bill in the full length "lounge" back seat and Joyce in one of the two front seat single "lounge" chairs. Bill took his tiller steering, pushed down on a floor pedal to reverse the polarity and we were off, gliding backwards up the driveway. Another push of the pedal and we were off around the block, with only a slight whirring of the motor. Bill confessed that the local constabulary aren't fussed about his driving from the back seat! Wonder why?

We climbed a steady grade without effort and Bill described that it just seemed to take on more grunt when faced with a climb. It was absolute fun. I don't know about its top speed but it would be great for nicking down to the shops. Mind you, there wouldn't be much room for groceries when both the bonnet and boot spaces were full of deep-cycle batteries!

When we returned, as I stepped down, I noticed the perfect "Rauch and Lang" moulding in the running board and asked Bill where he scored the reproduction mats. His reply was, "They're the originals." Wow! It's sure an indication of the originality of the car. Bill had earlier pointed out it still had the internal locking door "buttons" à la our 50's and 60's cars. We were safe from any hijackers were we stopped at the lights!

The Arnolds were treated next to whizz around the block. I stood impatiently with my phone, waiting to record their return around the corner at the bottom of the street. I say "impatiently" because I had to keep watching. There was no use waiting for the sound of the motor!

Thank you, Bill, for a 1917 thrill. I have my doubts about the near future of electric cars in our country but the ride with you was terrific.

Footnotes:

Our grand-daughter-in-law has a Tesla and last week, we were taken for a ride in our daughter and son-in-law's new electric "E-something-something" so they don't share my misgivings about the future.

If you look closely in one of the photos, you'll see Bill's and my reflection in the full-width mirror.













CAMILLE JENATZY

Our friendly neighbour Chris often comes across the road to have afternoon-tea with us. We then "talk of many things". Recently the subject was electric cars. We agreed that they were a no-no at present but perhaps a hybrid later.

I recalled that many years ago there was an electric car driven by the Belgian Camille Jenatzy and it achieved a record speed of 100 kph. It was named "La Jamais Contente" (The Never Contented).

La Jamais Contente was the first road vehicle to go over 100 kilometres per hour (62 mph). It was a Belgian electric vehicle with a light-alloy torpedoshaped bodywork and batteries. The high position of the driver and the exposed chassis underneath spoiled much of the aerodynamics. The light alloy, called partinium, is a mixture of aluminium, tungsten and magnesium.



The land speed record was established on 29 April or 1 May 1899 at Achères, Yvelines near Paris. The vehicle had two Postel-Vinay 25 kW motors, each driving the rear axle via a chain, running at 200 V and drawing 124 A each, for about 68 hp total, and was equipped with Michelin tyres. The chassis was number 25.

Camille was the son of Constant Jenatzy, a manufacturer of rubber products (rubber was still a novelty at the time). Camille had studied as an engineer, with an interest in electric-traction automobiles. He became known for his record-breaking speed runs and was nicknamed *Le Diable Rouge* ("The Red Devil") for the colour of his beard.

Jenatzy died in 1913 in a hunting accident. He went behind a bush and made animal noises as a prank on his friends who were hunting with him. <u>Alfred Madoux</u>, director of the journal <u>L'Etoile Belge</u>, fired, believing it was a wild animal. When they realised it was Jenatzy, they rushed him to hospital by car; he bled to death en route, fulfilling his own prophecy he would die in a Mercedes. He is buried at the Laeken Cemetery in Brussels.

* * * * *

I have a model of this car which I saw on a bric-a-brac stall at a Toowoomba Swap many years ago. I snapped it up for \$10 as I had neither seen nor heard of the model. It is branded Rio, was made in Italy and is number 1/49. It is a perfect copy, in the correct colour scheme of silver and red and even has movable tiller steering.







ON THIS DAY IN MOTORING HISTORY - 6 MARCH

1896

Charles Brady King, an American engineer and entrepreneur test-drove his first car along Woodward Avenue in Detroit, Michigan, in front of hundreds of spectators at speeds up to 7 mph, becoming the first man to drive a car in the Motor City.

In 1893 King had a display at the Chicago World's Fair for his pneumatic hammer and brake beam for railroad cars. While there he saw the self-propelled carriage designed and built by Gottlieb Daimler, inspiring him to begin designing his own car in Detroit. The car was powered by a Sintz engine. While driving up and down Woodward Avenue his Horseless Carriage broke down, spectators responded by telling him to "get a horse". The following report appeared in the Detroit Journal the next day: "The first horseless carriage seen in this city was out on the streets last night. The apparatus seemed to work all right and it went at the rate of five or six miles an hour at an even rate of speed." Following the car intently on a bicycle through the cold, snowy Detroit streets was a lanky, 32-year-old mechanical engineer who worked for the Edison Illuminating Co. His name was Henry Ford'

King's horseless carriage was on the streets and sold before Henry Ford's Quadricycle, which King helped Ford build.



1898

MARSEILLE TO NICE 2-DAY RACE.BEGAN The race which was over a distance of 140 miles (236 km)t was won the following day by Fernand Charron driving an 8hp Panhard et Levassor through a rain soaked, rut filled course. Gilles Hourgières, René De Knyff came in second and third, both also driving Panhards. Finishing 27th overall and 4th in her class was a driver of a De Dion motorized tricycle, who went by the name of Madame Laumaille – the earliest recorded woman racing driver.
