



It seems appropriate here to recognise some of the important Inventions made by Women.

MARY ANDERSON – THE WINDSCREEN WIPER

Mary Elizabeth Anderson (1866-1953) was an American real estate developer, rancher, viticulturist, and inventor of the windshield wiper. On November 10, 1903 she was granted her first patent (number 743,801) by the US Patent Office for her automatic car window cleaning device controlled from inside the car, called the windshield wiper.



On a visit to New York City in the winter of 1902, Mary sat in a trolley car on a frosty day. She observed that the driver struggled to see past the windows because of the falling sleet. The trolley car's front window was designed for bad-weather visibility, but its multi-pane windshield system worked very poorly. Therefore, to clear the sights, the driver needed to open the window, lean out of the vehicle, or stop the car to go outside in order to wipe the windscreen with his or her hands. Anderson, who was not an engineer but an entrepreneur, identified the problem and its opportunity. She envisaged a windshield wiper blade that the trolley driver could operate from the inside. At that time, it rarely occurred to anyone else to eliminate the problem. It was something drivers simply accepted and dealt with.

On her return to <u>Alabama</u> Mary hired a designer for a hand-operated device to keep a windshield clear and had a local Company produce a working model. She applied for, and in 1903 was granted, a 17-year patent for a windshield wiper. The patent application was filed on June 18, 1903.

Her device consisted of a lever inside the vehicle that controlled a rubber blade on the outside of the windshield. The lever could be operated to cause the spring-loaded arm to move back and forth across the windshield. A counterweight was used to ensure contact between the wiper and the window. The device could be easily removed if desired after the winter was over. Similar devices had been made earlier, but Mary's was the first windshield clearing device to be effective. Her simple mechanism and basic design have remained much the same, but unlike today's windscreen wipers, could be removed when not needed.

MARGARET WILCOX – AUTOMOTIVE HEATING SYSTEM

Margaret Wilcox was born in 1838 in New York. Little is known about her early life, common for many women of her era, whose personal histories were often overshadowed by their male counterparts. Wilcox showed an early interest in mechanical engineering despite the society conventions of her era, which often restricted women's roles to domestic domains.



Throughout her career, Margaret showed a creative spirit and adeptness at navigating the traditionally male-dominated field of mechanical engineering. During her lifetime, she made the most notable contribution to transportation comfort when she invented the car heater. By using the heat produced by cars' internal combustion engines, this device directed warm air into the passenger compartment. Although her invention, which was patented in 1893, was innovative in that it made use of the engine's residual heat, it was originally designed without a temperature control system, which resulted in overheating.

Mary faced many of the same difficulties that other female inventors of her era had during her career. Women filing patents under their own names was still uncommon and frequently challenging in the late 19th century. Despite these challenges she persisted and was able to patent her creations, which is evidence of her drive and aptitude as an engineer and inventor. Her contributions—the car heating system in particular - have subsequently been acknowledged as key innovations in the automotive sector.

ANNA CONNELLY - 1868 - 1969. THE FIRE ESCAPE

In 1860, a fire occurred in New York City due to a fire in a bakery that was able to reach the homes above it, with families inside. To prevent similar events, in 1870 a law about fire safety was made; stating that "fireproof balconies have to be connected by fireproof stairs", thereby increasing costs for landowners. Connelly was aware of fire safety issues and the legislation, so she decided to invent a different solution, a fire escape design that could be adopted by more landowners to increase building safety in cities. Connelly's device, which was made of iron, was patented in August 1877 (No. 386,816A). At first her invention was planned for an upward escape, since most of the fires causing concerns started at the lower floors of buildings. She invented a platform in which people could escape from a building on fire to a safe one by going down the stairs before fire could reach them. She stated, "My invention relates to improvements in fire-escapes; and it consists of a bridge surrounded by a railing and having openings in the ends of the floor thereof, as herein described, the said bridge being adapted to be placed on the roofs of adjoining or adjacent buildings, thereby permitting the ready and safe passage from one roof to the other." Her design changed, causing it to consist of a series of metal platforms attached to the side of a building; the platforms were connected by a series of ladders and incorporated handrails.

OUR MEMBERS HAVE BEEN ACQUIRING NEW VETERANS.

Régie has acquired a Veteran. Early in the year she and Terry had heard rumours that a 1918 American built Essex, one of the first imported into Australia, was stored under a house for the last 40 years. The car found in a dump in the mid 1960s, was fully restored, then the owner died and she was parked in the shed. So Régie is now her custodian and affectionately calls her "Essie". Completely by coincidence they were able to find the person who found the car at the dump and reunite them!

As January 26 is a Public Holiday, it seems appropriate this month to feature Australian-built vehicles.

THE SHEARER was a mallee wood-fired steam car that David Shearer (1850-1936), a blacksmith and farm machinery maker, designed and built, together with his brother John for his own use. By 1897 he was driving the "steam carriage" around Mannum, with the world's first differential, much to the consternation of the local horses.

Shearer's vehicle travelled at 15 miles an hour, faster than England's first car two years later that reached 10-12 mph. In 1900 he was granted special permission for his "automobile" to be driven in Adelaide city streets. at the Adelaide Chamber of Manufacturers Exhibition.

Shearer wasn't interested in making cars. He just wanted to prove the horseless carriage was workable. After his success, he returned to making agricultural machinery.

The vehicle was restored prior to being taken to England for the 1999 London to Brighton Run and is now on display at the National Motor Museum in Birdwood, South Australia.

[Alan Robinson says that he drove the Shearer for one lap of the Test Track at Birdwood and it was the most frightening experience that he has had at the wheel of a vehicle].

THE AUSTRALIS

The **Australis** was an Australian <u>automobile</u> manufactured at the Austral Gas Engine Works in <u>Leichhardt</u>, <u>New South Wales</u>, from 1896 to 1906 by **G.W. & G. Wood**. The Company began production with a motor driven bicycle in 1895. Only three Australis vehicles were produced: a second motor driven bicycle in 1896, a <u>single-cylinder</u> 3<u>hp</u> two-seat light <u>buggy</u> in 1900 and a 7hp (5 kW) twin-cylinder light buggy in 1906.

The original engine from the 1900 Australis buggy is now part of the <u>Powerhouse Museum</u> collection and is thought to be the oldest surviving Australian built engine.

- Statewide celebrations marked 100 years since Queensland became a State, separated from New South Wales.
- Our Club held the Golden Fleece Centenary Veteran Car Rally. Ninety Veterans
 from all over Australia started at the Brisbane Exhibition Grounds and finished at the
 new Lennons Hotel, in the sandhills of Broadbeach.
- The Queensland Government hosted "The Centenary Cavalcade of Transport" a four mile long procession of 300 units representing land and air transport over the years.
- It was the year that George Gilltrap brought his family and antique car collection from Rotorua New Zealand and opened Gilltraps Auto Museum at Kirra on the Gold Coast.

The <u>Video section of Archives</u> in our website <u>https://www.vccaq.com/archive</u> includes a home movie of the 1959 Rally. We have now obtained the official programme and entrants' list to accompany the video.

Many thanks to Malcolm Wegener who has provided us with the official programme of the Centenary Cavalcade of Transport, listing 14 veteran cars from our Club. These documents are with our Webmaster for inclusion. Watch this space!

We have been working with Robyn Lake (nee Gilltrap) to put together a record of the Gilltrap dynasty and its impact on the veteran scene in Queensland. Most will agree that it was *Genevieve*, the movie, and Gilltraps Auto Museum that popularised Veteran vehicles in Queensland. Robyn has generously opened the family albums to provide some great photos of the Museum in its heyday. We now need to assemble text to accompany the photos. Member Frank Muggeridge accompanied the Gilltrap family when they migrated here and worked in the Museum for many years. His recollections will be invaluable. The 125th Anniversary of Renault and the appearance of the de Dion Bouton vis-à-vis

'A Real Christmas Tale' – Rue Lepic Montmartre 1898 [Early Auto December 2021p.14 &15 www.veterancarclubofwa.asn.au/EarlyAuto/2021DecEA.pdf] described 'A wonderful story set in Montmartre Christmas Eve 1898 that was expanded in 1955 by St Loup in Renault de Billancourt and occasionally regurgitated' that began by claiming ' ... Louis Renault going up and down one of the steepest and highest hills in Paris on 24 December 1898 in an automobile is one of the best-known Renault stories, being mentioned in nearly every reference to the marque.'

The story ended '... Whatever happened that Christmas Eve in 1898 the fact is that the Louis Renault '... became the foundation stone for a huge industrial empire...' [Renault *Regie Nationale*] – an empire that is described by Charles de Gaulle in his *mémoires* as the 'first and finest factory in France'.


'The Automobile constructed by Louis Renault in 1898 – the *Louis Renault*' Early Auto January 2022 pp. 14 & 15 [www.veterancarclubofwa.asn.au/EarlyAuto/2022FebEA.pdf] describes the automobile Saint Loup simply refers to as the *Louis Renault*.

Most stories covering the period September 1898 to March 1899 published since 1956 seem to be based on the story as told by Saint Loup that was 'carefully translated' into English that 'is in the main accurate.' [The Veteran and Vintage Magazine Volume 2 No. 6 February 1958 p. 513.]

In A Sequel to 'A Real Christmas Tale' – Rue Lepic Montmartre 1898 [Early Auto January 2022 pp. 15 & 16 www.veterancarclubofwa.asn.au/au /EarlyAuto/2022JanEA.pdf] mention is made of two significant documents – the application to patent an invention dated 9 February 1899



and the registration of a company - Renault Frères - dated 25 February 1899.




More recently, I was made aware of nuances in the terminology used in production. As a consequence, I am satisfied that on 14 March 1899, at 139 *rue du Point du Jour, Billancourt*, the prototype with revolutionary direct-drive transmission, *Michelin* tyres and 1 cv. ³/₄ *de Dion Bouton* air-cooled motor appeared.

1898 Prototype Artists Impression



Soon after, at 36 *Quai National, Puteaux*, another prototype with a rigid rear axle and a reported 3 ch.1/4 *de Dion Bouton* water-cooled motor appeared.

Incidentally, to celebrate the centenary of de Dion Bouton Quai National was re-named Quai de Dion Bouton.



To celebrate these anniversaries, devotees of *Renault*, *de Dion Bouton*, *Michelin*, and other French motoring enthusiasts will be gathering at various places to pay tribute to the contributions made by *de Dion, Bouton & Trepardoux* to the science of mechanical and aeronautical engineering and Louis Renault - the person Lord Montagu of Beaulieu described as '*epitomizing the age of the motor-car in France during the first half of* 'last century.

Furthermore, the arrival in Australia of the Renault 4cv. – the last 'Louis Renault' model – with sales in the week beginning 21 February 1949 provides a wonderful opportunity for the impressive number of 4 cv. enthusiasts, some of whom own other models attributable to Louis Renault, to hold extraordinary musters to celebrate this 75th anniversary of a model that reached 500,000 sales worldwide on 8 April 1954!



Indeed, everyone interested in the history of the automobile is encouraged to acknowledge with a celebration of sorts any or all of these significant occasions.
