

President's Report for the 2013-2014 Year

Firstly, your Club has gone beyond being a minor recreational or hobby club whose principal function was to provide facilities for those who wish to participate in motoring in ancient motor cars. Rest assured, that desire is still there but we have moved on from there to become a Club with diverse activities including the ownership of property, the successful letting of same to other organisations and the consequent obligations that property demands.

There are now over 200 members whose needs require management and, fortunately, the administration and financial management functions have evolved into a capable pair of our lady members, Hazel Burley and Rhonda Guthrie, who can answer most of the questions most of the time. In this respect also our ability to access expert and seasoned financial advice from Robert Lovell has been of considerable help in developing a sound financial management system. An investment in a new computer and other necessary equipment have been acquired.

While this has been happening the members of the Club's "Strategic Advisory Group", (using the acronym SAG for obvious reasons) has been beavering away addressing a list of factors and perceived needs which have led to recommendations to the Club's committee for consideration and, if worthy, entry into the Club's register of By-Laws which lists, for the first time, an identifiable set of policy matters directing the Club's efforts in the right direction. The pursuit of directions like the long range future of the Club's investment property, the house on our frontage to Old Cleveland Rd, need a little bit of sophisticated touch before we take the plunge to either scrap it, or totally rebuild what was really a hovel which should have been condemned. Having done the work we reckon the investment rental return should make it a good thing.

Having reached this point, where we have an ongoing need for financial expertise as well as the physical parts of an association with expanded property management, it seems clear to me that the whole could be joined to one responsibility of property management, run by a sub-committee of members with a responsibility for all aspects of all property matters: maintenance, repairs and renewals, tenancies, other rentals and enquiries. Such a structure, with adequate personnel, would ease the pressure on existing people and develop a wider set of skills.

Generally, I believe your elected Committee have performed well although some longer absences have made some things a little difficult at times. I feel your committee is too numerically small and I would urge this meeting to increase the number so as some existing positions may function better in the things they/he/she do. Additionally there are sub-committees not operating as well as we should expect, particularly those relating to the gathering of information about what is happening in other areas of recreational motoring.

We in VCCAQ are probably the oldest club, probably the most harmonious club, and probably the most social and congenial club in Queensland, but we fall short in our knowledge of what goes on in other sectors. We don't seek information about what others are doing, we have no structure to acquire information or intelligence about our environment or Government sensitivities. As dull as these items may seem, they are real, they are here to stay, and it may reward us well to keep in mind that having rich and powerful friends may be amongst our most valuable assets.

The social activity in the Club is excellent, seems to be well structured with a lot of contact on a very cordial base, many members belonging to separate groups because of some common bond. The "Diners" group, who grace the fine dining area of the veranda during the couple of hours prior to our regular monthly meetings, have become something of an institution where all manner of things can be learned, or displayed. Observers tell me that this function, with its capacity for mildly lubricated tonsils, can make or break a Chairman's determination into fragments.

Reference to the inside cover of the monthly newsletter (VT for short) will show a good number of sub-committees, listing a particular area of interest and consist of:

"Dating Committee" which fills an important part of what we need to have our cars authenticated and comprising experienced members.

"VT editor" Carolyn Robinson, who would rather be a publisher so long as she does not have to be a reporter, or is it the reverse of that? Carolyn is always looking for publishable material for inclusion in VT and would appreciate your help.

"Club Historian" Denis Martin, is Club Historian with a passionate interest in small French cars, as well as giving his expertise as an ordained Clergyman, from time to time. Denis's vocation has been called upon more than once this year, he officiating at the funeral service of a number of our members.

"Property Director" David Hackshall has control and direction of the grounds maintenance and fixed assets of the Club and who, with brother Michael, led the transformation of our rental house from hovel to haven.

"Webmaster", Peter Ransom, a former IT professional in another life, this year completed an updated revision of the Club's web site to what you see today.

"Events". those places and times when we get to drive the cars, in places and times as far apart as Shepparton and Toogoolawah. Russell Massey has a sub-committee comprised of whoever else he can get to help him. This is Russell's first year, with a workload said to be a balance. In relation to all the factors which should be taken into account, Russell has done very well.

There are more sub-committees, particularly the SAG group which warrant our activities. People here are experienced, with wide knowledge in the workings of private business, amongst other things. The formation of SAG, with its single purpose, has given direction to the Club executive on a long term basis.

Finally, I feel that I should comment briefly about my position as President for the last year. As you may already know I have never aspired to hold the office for any period at all. It was only the circumstances prevailing at the time, in the last hours before the AGM that I decided to accept nomination for the job. The last year has been a busy one for me and I confess I have enjoyed working in the position, with the people who want to make a difference. I believe we have done just that and I thank them all for their assistance. At this particular time I am enjoying better health than any other for quite some time and that certainly helps. I am most grateful.

I especially want to thank my wife, Val, for her patience, understanding and assistance to me during the year. She also has learned to place a high value on the friendship made and retained, a giant leap forward for now and beyond. We look forward to many more years of happy membership.

Librarian's Report

I have catalogued into the Library the copies of *The Car Illustrated* that we have.

We have about 40 copies covering most of 1904.

There are many interesting anecdotal type articles there about issues being faced by the motoring groups in 1904.

Space permitting we will include a few short articles each month which are extracts during this period, the first of which are reproduced below.

Motoring in 1904 (The Car Illustrated)

Use of the Horn

An appeal appeared in a letter to one of the Automobile journals recently for the invention of some less offensive instrument in lieu of the present grunting horn. The horn came to us in this country along with a number of other objectionable things such as foreign names, foreign scorchers, and foreign styles. It was used on Paris public conveyancing long before the advent of the motor car.

The grievance is a real one, so much so that the public are rebelling against the discordant noise which disturbs the nerves of the citizen. Experience shows that the toot of the horn no longer causes any foot passenger to look round or hasten his steps. [The writer] finds that if it is desired to attract attention, the only effective mode is the time honoured Geeh-hup of the horse driver; and only the other day he saw record of a resolution calling for legislation to put a stop to the frequent and unnecessary use of the horn. This is an amusing change of front. Formerly, the motorist who could not prove he had sounded his horn was always found in the wrong if anything happened.

Would it not be possible to use some pleasant toned instrument, such as an organ pipe? It would be a favour if this matter were considered by readers who are skilled in acoustics. A simple and sweet-sounding instrument might thus be produced which would replace the raucous horn.





Council Road Works (Not much has changed?)

Sometimes the British working man forgets that careful note may be taken of his dilatory ways, or, on the other hand, perhaps does not mind anyone seeing his desire not to do too much work. In the neighbourhood of Piccadilly Circus lately some sections of wood paving have been re-laid and although the gangs of the City of Westminster are, I believe, supposed to be working overtime and by night as well, the progress of these repairs has been excessively slow, and the want of energy manifested has been simply phenomenal. I do not know that whether in this case there is a trades' union which orders that men employed in laying wood pavements shall not handle more than a certain number of blocks per day, but it almost seems as if something of this kind was the case. My readers will also remember a piece of roadway which was re-laid in the months of February and March in Whitehall. No attempt was made in this case to accelerate the work, which was delaying the whole of the traffic between Trafalgar Square and Westminster Bridge and Victoria. Some city councils seem curiously apathetic as to the need for removing causes of congestion in traffic. On the other hand, when repairs are made in the permanent way on any of our great railway systems, gangs of men work - and really work - night and day, and every gang takes a pride in doing its work as quickly as possible. But in street repairs there seems to be no desire on the part of either the authorities or those employed by them to hurry themselves in any way. The effect of this dilatoriness is seen in the continual blocking of traffic and serious loss of time to the public. The Royal Commission on London Traffic should take note of this point and consider it in connection with their report.
