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## The Wheel Turns. 1905 De Dion - Charleville's First Vehicle.

This 1905 De Dion was one of the very first cars to come to Queensland new in 1905. It was purchased new by a business owner in Charleville. Not much is known about its early days, but we understand it was imported to Australia by one of the Calcino Family, who owned a business called Bishop & Calcino - it was a pushbike business.

Many years later when it was owned by a travelling bore driller, it broke down outside Quilpie. It lay dormant in a paddock for more than 50 years until discovered by Dave Trail in the early 1960's when restoration was commenced. Dave was an engineer and owner of Trail Ice Pty. Ltd. in Fortitude Valley (Brisbane). The car was in a very sad condition but



at least it was a complete vehicle.

Sadly not long after the car was restored, Dave passed away. The car re-surfaced again in 2007 and Rhonda & I bought it and once again it lives in Queensland.


It was re-painted in two toned green stripes with yellow pin striping and black guards. Two toned green stripe paint work, was an extra 5 pounds from the factory when new. One of its unusual features is a swing front passenger seat which allows passengers to enter the rear from the front. It's a single cylinder, 8hp engine and gives lively performance on the road. Yes, it is coming to Charleville.

## The First Air Race from England to Australia 1919

In 1919 the acting Australian Prime Minister William Alexander Watt announced, on behalf of Prime Minister William "Billy" Hughes that the Commonwealth Government would offer a prize of £10,000 for the first successful flight to Australia from Great Britain in under 30 days. Six aircraft began the journey, but only the Vickers Vimy, piloted by the Australian brothers Ross and Keith Smith, completed the journey and happily accepted the prize.

On route to Melbourne, they landed their Vickers Vimy on Ward Plain, just outside Charleville for refuelling. Upon takeoff, the starboard engine broke a conrod. After the emergency landing, the engine was removed and railed to Ipswich Railway workshop for repairs. There, two conrods were successfully fabricated and refitted. We will visit the site of the landing and hear from George Balsallie, a local historian, where you will learn much more about their arduous journey.
