### THE TARRANT - THE CAR DEPICTED ON OUR CLUB BADGE

Harley Tarrant (born Clunes, Victoria: 1860-1949).

In August 1897 Tarrant patented an engine powered by kerosene, a fuel which he declared to be safe, cheap and readily available, whereas electric motors needed recharging stations. Although his first car was a failure, its kerosene motor proved suitable for such stationary work as pumping water to farm houses. By 1899 he sold his engines as far afield as WA.

With larger premises, the company also imported cars, beginning in February 1900 with a Benz. Tarrant completed his first car in Victoria in 1901, this had a Benz engine. The next car, built two years later was 90% locally made. The Tarrant was a 2 cylinder, 2-seat vehicle and about 16 cars were produced between 1900 and 1907. After a small number of motor vehicles were built, it became apparent it was uneconomic to build Australian vehicles in the face of overseas technology. Tarrant assumed the responsibility for distribution of Ford automobiles in Victoria in 1908, and production of Tarrants ceased.

The last surviving Tarrant was acquired by the RACV in 2002.

**General Business:** Discussion re Special Interest Vehicle conditions and restrictions, all the information is on the Dept of Main Roads website.

SIV must NOT be used for general purpose e.g., going to work and cannot be hired or have any reward for supplying the vehicle.

SIV must only be used for rallies or events including impromptu events organised by an incorporated club. Rally is a social event where vehicles travel together for competition or an agreed location. An impromptu event is an event that has been initiated by a club member, involves one or more vehicles, and is supported by an incorporated vehicle club. Rallies and events (including impromptu events) must be listed in the incorporated club's newsletter, website or social media page prior to the event.

If your Special Interest Vehicle does not have permanent lighting, you must always carry a removable lighting system with the vehicle and use that system whenever lighting would normally be required. Carbide lights are acceptable where that type of light was originally fitted.

We need to establish a member protected section on the website to use for impromptu rallies, at the next committee meeting we will develop a procedure to be able to use the website for impromptu events. For full details go to the Main Roads website.

## The following is reproduced for interest of members from the latest Wanganui (NZ) Vintage Car Club Magazine

"FIVA has produced a guide for Historic Motoring - some of this is likely to impact on NZ and our ability to drive our older vehicles at any time - anywhere. Fuel supplies may also become a problem in the future as more and more vehicles are produced on alternative fuels or electricity. Suitable Training for apprentices to work on "Historic Vehicles" is already a concern in many countries. Holland has reduced air pollution by 90% in the last 18 years - it is a major concern in Europe But here in NZ we have been fortunate so far that the motor industry has not been directed to cut back on Diesel and Petrol vehicles. There is a growing awareness to preserve vehicles rather than restore them but world wide there are concerns over the use and preservation of our Historic Fleet. You and I can play our part in this by keeping our VCC Eligible vehicles up to scratch and in good condition. Apparently Caltex is one of the few Companies that do not have Ethanol in fuel currently. Fuel Companies can have up to 5% Ethanol content without any disclosure and many of our older vehicles cannot handle this mix, or a greater %."

## Temora Event en-route to the Bright 1 & 2 cylinder Run March 2019, by Gary Day

This story begins with Kathy and I being asked if we would like to attend our first ever one and two cylinder car event. This one was being held in Bright, Victoria and we would be accompanying my brother John and his wife Alison who entered their 1903 curved dash Oldsmobile.

As we have attended quite a few veteran car events in the last few years since retiring, we naturally accepted the invitation. On our way to Bright, the Queensland contingent stopped over in the town of Temora for a separate run organised by Rhonda Guthrie. Rhonda spent much of her childhood in this area and on our arrival, provided us with a comprehensive rally booklet with all the necessary information on each town we were to visit on this stop-over on our way to Bright.

Approximately ten families arrived at our chosen caravan park in Temora to enjoy six days of fine weather and great scenery around this town in the north east Riverina area of New South Wales approximately 420 kilometres south west of Sydney. Never having visited Temora before, we were so surprised to learn that we were going to stay at a caravan park situated right beside the town airfield. This wasn't just any ordinary airfield.

Temora was reported as being the friendliest town in New South Wales, following a series of mentions in the Sydney Morning Herald's Column 8 which organised a bus trip to the town for Sydney readers in 2005 (info from Wikipedia) It has a rather unique airfield or rather a housing estate called an airpark. Here, 50+ housing blocks of between 1000 and 2024 square metres have room for a domestic residence facing a normal street frontage but with room for an aircraft hangar behind the house with access for the aircraft to a runway leading to the main air strips. The town also seemed to have a reliable supply of water as the lawns around the park were



lush and green, a noticeable difference to the country we had travelled through on our way down there. Temora also boasts an air museum which houses many warbirds including two of Australia's only operating Spitfires.





Whilst we may remember the movie "The Castle" where the house situated right beside the airfield was bombarded with aircraft noise, it was a novelty to be able to sit and enjoy 5 o'clock drinks and nibbles whilst watching some very interesting aircraft take off and land including some formation flying. We also just happened to enjoy one of the most spectacular sunsets to top it off.



Our first night at this van park, we were greeted by the local vintage car club members at a BBQ in the camp kitchen. Some of the group also attended our runs in their vehicles. This group also provided some of that legendary country hospitality with morning and afternoon teas which was most welcomed after travelling in the old cars along the country roads. The word soon spread around town that the old cars were at the airfield and we were visited by friendly locals who kindly assisted us when we needed a bit of mechanical workshop help in the form of some welding gear and a bench inside one of the hangars. This hangar was big enough to drive a car and caravan around inside it, let alone the fact that it also had a mezzanine floor for storage of more equipment. Just a restorer's dream!



Another couple, Sam and Carol, invited us all to their hangar to see what it is that attracts folks to this airpark. We were shown the aircraft that Sam had built (an RV6 kit plane) and Carol's plane.

Some of our members commented that they had visited the factory where this plane was built. Carol had flown this small single seat plane all over Australia including the remote Kimberley area.

Sam also showed us an old photo of his grandfather's car in the USA and challenged us to identify it. John was spot on with his identification of a 1908 Rambler, much to Sam's surprise!

Another surprise at Temora was when we visited the world renowned Warbird museum. Whilst the Brooks' and I were viewing the big Canberra bomber from a high level viewing platform, we were greeted by a young fellow down on the work floor. It was Alex Allum, a third generation vintage







car club member who is now working his dream job as an aviation mechanic on the warbirds. Alex's grandfather Fred (deceased) was a well known member of the BVAC in Brisbane years ago. Alex took Kevin Brooks and me for a drive in his modern car, a 70's Ford Cougar. He also joined the group for the final night's dinner at the local RSL. Temora has an excellent information centre and museum where the veteran cars assembled for a display whilst we all viewed the very well presented history of the Temora area. Displays included a fire station, ambulance collection, Sir Donald Bradman's first slab cottage, school and church buildings, printing and flour mill buildings along with the huge working diesel engine which powered the mill. The early settler's horse drawn and motorised transport vehicles and clothing, a comprehensive mineral display and much more. We could have spent days there as with most collections of this calibre. My personal interest was in the American LaFrance fire engine circa 1940's which was powered by a V12 engine with twin ignition, 24 spark plugs, two distributors and four ignition coils, I believe it also has two starter motors, all for absolute reliability.

Our Temora stay also included a visit to Rhonda's family where we were able to view a collection of early Holdens, Fords and Chryslers many of which are now very valuable collectors' items.

Each day of our Temora experience included a drive to one of the nearby towns of Coolamon and Ariah Park, Junee and Cootamundra along outback country roads just perfect for the Oldsmobile. It was on the run to Junee that we experienced a race with a rabbit and a wallaby at around 30 kph, each animal racing alongside us in the bush between the road and a property fence line. For around a kilometre or so, they exhibited amazing stamina before they found their way off in to the surrounding countryside. Rhonda's comprehensive instruction booklet made sure we could see many of each town's main attractions. Some of these we visited were the Coolamon cheese factory, creating hand crafted cheeses and attracting much needed tourism to this town.

We also saw the Coolamon Up-To-Date Store/Museum, a turn of the century department store where anything from a plough to a piano could be purchased. The store still has the world's only known Ball Style Cash Railway System which is still in its original location and is listed on the State Heritage Register. This system allowed shoppers' cash to be carried from the service counter to the central office and return with receipts and change. This system pre dated the Lamson vacuum systems which I can remember in stores in Brisbane.

In Ariah Park (population 268 and National Trust Listed) we were treated to afternoon tea provided by some local car club members whilst we enjoyed a stroll along the wide street of this beautiful old town where you could imagine that our cars were just parked there by locals doing their shopping. Even the vintage glass cylinder type petrol bowsers which the town is known for (Wowsers Bowsers and Peppercorn Trees) were still in their original position on the footpath. I think that this town was one of the highlights of my Temora area experience.





In Junee, the main attraction was the Licorice and Chocolate Factory at a restored flour mill once again attracting tourism to this area. A local car collection was also an attraction for us in a building beside the factory. Our visit to Junee wouldn't have been complete without visiting the town's Roundhouse Railway Museum. When built, the 100 foot turntable was the largest in the southern hemisphere. During the 48

years of Government railway operation, virtually every class of steam and diesel locomotive, self propelled rail cars, modern XPT power cars and some interstate locomotives received attention at this Junee Roundhouse enclosed in a large circular brick building. Another interesting railcar was the 1912-1914 mail sorting van with provision for four or five postal workers to work at a long bench with sorting racks and pigeon holes fixed above the bench to enable mail sorting en route. It was in service until the 1980's when NSW railways lost the contract to carry mail. The railway station is still in operation

and our tour organiser Rhonda remembers travelling as a child to Sydney for holidays in trains just like those on display in the museum.

Our last day of visiting the country around Temora was to the town of Cootamundra, the birthplace of Sir Donald Bradman AC regarded as the greatest cricketing batsman of all time, and home of the Cootamundra Wattle. Our morning tea was enjoyed at Jubilee Park where the "Captain's Walk" is located. Here the main attraction is an impressive collection of 42 plinth mounted busts of all the Australian cricket captains. Once again, these towns attract tourism and Cootamundra was no exception. We also visited the small cottage where Sir Donald was born on 27<sup>th</sup> August 1908 in what was then a private hospital.

All the towns we visited seemed most proud of their heritage and exhibited the wealth of what must have been very prosperous times in the early 1900's when

gold, wool and wheat supported businesses to create these buildings with their elaborate brickwork, fancy metal pan ceilings and beautiful leadlight shop fronts. The roads we travelled on in the Oldsmobile were just perfect for the old vehicles with undulating countryside without worrying about holding up traffic and at 30 odd kilometres an hour, we were certainly able to absorb the fresh air and enjoy the scenery whilst our wives travelled in the modern and were able to take in the op shops and quilting supply shops while they waited for us to arrive in each town, a win win situation for us all

Rhonda is to be congratulated for organising this visit and sharing some of her early childhood memories in this beautiful part of our "lucky country". It was an excellent start to weeks of total enjoyment of the old cars in the company of like minded folks before we moved on to the main event at Bright and the Alpine region of Victoria






### Pictures from the Past - Kevin and Joyce Brooks.
