Stanthorpe Veteran Club Rally - Joe Jarick

8Th October-13th October

Seventy six Queenslanders registered for this year's National Veteran Rally in Swan Hill, hosted by the Victorian Club. Like almost every event, this year's National Rally had been postponed from last year. Consequently, we were all looking forward to a few weeks away and veteran rallying with four hundred likeminded enthusiasts.

Following an enormous effort by Michael and Claudia Holding, National Rally organisers in rescheduling the event and arrangements for four hundred members for a second time, unfortunately, it was not to be. News of the event cancellation was received in mid-August.

Back to our seventy-six intrepid Queensland veteran motorists, all dressed up and nowhere to go!

Not to be too disappointed, our Queensland Veteran Club committee set to work to deliver a 'replacement' event. Russell and Susan Massey devised the rally routes and instructions, and with the support of Rhonda and Ross Guthrie who checked the routes, developed a seven-day rally program commencing on 8th October

for a week. Time was short, and an excellent rally

program was delivered.

Following a lengthy period of drought, the Granite Belt countryside looked fantastic after quite a bit of recent rain. Storm King Dam was full along with most farm dams we passed on our way to Stanthorpe. Regardless of where we were, period dressed veteran motorists were warmly welcomed by the locals and apart from spending some much needed money in the community, late in the rally we also managed to bring a few more days of decent rain to the region.

Rally HQ was the 'Top of Town' Caravan Park, a location that worked well being both close to town centre and most venues plus only a short walk to 'Happy Hour.'



They take the cake as they would have had to juggle a couple of ferry trips while Tom and Jan Callow from Home Hill were not too far behind with their 1915 T. Check the enthusiasm, the longest of those distances is a 3600kms round trip and even the shortest is still 2800Kms!



Twenty-five veterans entered, plus a couple of vintage with some amazing distances covered by several members to attend. All the way from Cairns was Glenn Ridolfi with his 1908 Caddy and Grant Vormister & Melissa Cornish from Magnetic Island with their 1918 Dodge.



Living on both sides of the border must have its challenges yet, as residents of both the Gold Coast and Inverell, Bob and Suzanne Ausburn managed to get their 1912 Phoenix past Border Control with ease. Perhaps waving their Veteran Club membership card helped? They had Queensland style smiles all week, so guess that they must have been unmistakable as locals.

Of the veterans, fifteen different marques meant there was plenty of variety and the reliability was extremely high with just a few 'failing to proceed'. Although, Stanthorpe must be a town of miracles as a local picked up the keys to Glenn Adams Fiat in the main street and returned them to the caravan park.

Perhaps the finder could not get the Advance/Retard in the 'just right' position to start as am sure he must have been tempted.

Lyn and I were pleased to be invited by Kevin and Joyce Brooks as swaggies and were happy to be able to return the favour when later in the week Kevin's socks started getting a bit damp. A 1915 Buick is a fine touring machine, especially when you have such an experienced chauffeur.

Friday, our first rally day and following registration at 10:00, we were off on a short drive to Storm King Dam for a picnic lunch. Lyn and I have camped at the Somerville CP adjacent to the dam many times over the years but had never taken the road around the back of the dam. The instructions took us there, past some beautiful properties including a train enthusiast who not only had his own railway winding round his property, but a few full-size rail carriages here and there, suggesting he may have missed the rail boom of the 1880's.





President Sally and Rob were in their 1916 Dodge, a sensible choice given the forecast severe weather. 'Whitey' stayed at home in anticipation of the launch of Murray Hubbard's book 'Car Wars Down Under' in which 'Whitey' features prominently.



After lunch, Irene and Greg Hill recreated the 'typical' Edwardian picnic scene, right down to the wind-up gramophone. Unfortunately, I was forbidden to sing along in case I upset the locals fishing from a boat nearby. I thought singing appropriate as the tune Greg was playing was catchy. A pretty spot and as a lunchtime picnic location it was enjoyed by everyone.

Happy Hour was in the park lounge and pizzas arrived at 7:00, thankfully as I had not caught any fish. Speaking of fish, one for the technology challenged: How do you talk to a fish? You drop it a line....

Next day we were off to Vincenzo's 'Big Apple' for morning tea or as an alternative, the nearby Juice Factory. From there, a short drive to Stanthorpe Cheese to collect our pre-ordered cheese platter then on to the Soldier Settlement area at Amiens. With the veterans carefully parked in the school car park and a look at the miniature 'Cobbers' memorial carrying the names of the many participants of the Soldier Settlement Scheme, we retired to the shade of the school's pine trees where we sampled our cheese platters.

After lunch, Kevin Brooks gave a demonstration of how to change a flat tyre on a split rim using a committee. Some said it was an informative session but as the flat was on my side, I kept quiet as it was a long walk back. 5 O'clock Happy Hour as usual and by the noise of everyone talking at once, the crowd was settling in.

Sunday departure was a little later following a visit to the market at the Showgrounds adjacent to the CP. A big fright on my return from the market was finding Lyn spreadeagled on the concrete having done a Sugar Glider imitation out the caravan door! Following stemming the blood flow and patching up her extremities (forehead, knees, elbows and palms), she was game to go to the truffle farm. There we were given an interesting demonstration on finding truffles underground using dogs that are trained on site. A bonus demonstration was of trained sniffer dogs in action. A few years ago, a sniffer dog picked me out at the Norfolk Island Airport. I had a small Picnic chocolate in my pocket just in case the pilot overshot the island. There is a lot of water after Norfolk, and I find a Picnic relaxes me.



Returning to town, the instructions said 'Maybe' lunch at the RSL, and who was I to argue. For food, Stanthorpe tends to be one of the better RSL's and there were quite a few veteran motorists around a long table. Happy Hour came and went and with it some rain rolling in overnight.

Monday morning and we were off to a little park in Dalveen for morning tea. From there we headed to the Granite Belt Winery for lunch and a tasting paddle or two. A most enjoyable lunch but by then the rain was becoming persistent and most returned to the CP, a round trip of 54Klm. Come 5 O'clock it was Happy Hour again. The rain on the roof sending us off to sleep after another great rallying day. Perhaps it was Geoff and Barbara Clegg's nightcap of Vodka/jelly chasers. I could not taste the Vodka in the first one, but the second sure did not miss me.

Tuesday a very pleasant 60Klm tour was arranged through the outer suburbs of Stanthorpe on our way to the Blue Pot Café. I thought I knew Stanthorpe well but had never heard of this café and no wonder as it was tucked away out in the wilds. A few locals I subsequently spoke to also had not heard of it. They like us, had been missing the delicious Devonshire teas served with great coffee. It did not take long to find that the cafe owner's side business was restoring early Holdens adjacent to the cafe. The opportunity was taken to wander through his workshop and chat about the many projects. Several members fondly remembering the idiosyncrasies of these, their first cars.

Back into town and lunch for us was a fantastic pie and coffee at Zest Pastries in the High Street. After a tour of the Op shops requested by Kevin we returned to the CP and before long it was Happy Hour time.



Wednesday we were off to Wallangarra Station on the NSW/Qld border. Again, touring by excellent and largely empty back roads we saw some wonderful countryside. Lots of wallabies were seen in the paddocks and a noticeable increase in the number of plots under vines from just a few years ago suggesting a maturing of the Stanthorpe product. With the border closed there was little traffic, mostly Police cars including radar with most veterans struggling to meet the officer's expectations.

On our arrival at Wallangarra on the border, we were served a delicious Devonshire tea at the Refreshment Room on the Wallangarra Station platform. Curiously, if you walked out the left-hand door of the station building, you were in New South Wales! A small but interesting museum was at the southern end of the platform and most took the opportunity to visit.

From there, back to the pub at Ballandean for a light lunch and then back to the CP, either by the highway or the delightful backroads. Today's run was 110 Ks and it was a pleasure to see Len and Fiona Kelly's 1910 Reo taking the distance in its stride.

Wednesday evening's Rally Farewell Dinner was in a function room at the RSL, with everyone in fine style, dressed to the nines in their formal gear, a little incongruous piling into the RSL Coaster bus instead of a Rolls Royce. Surprise, surprise, the return of buffet meals had the staff just as excited as we were. It appeared that members had not forgotten how a buffet works, judging by the size of their plates!

Stanthorpe Rally, 8 - 13 October 2021

Because of the disappointment of the long awaited Swan Hill Rally being cancelled once again, the committee decided to run a rally in Stanthorpe at approximately the same time. Fifty-six members attended in twenty-six antique cars and two moderns and travelled from as far away as Cairns and Magnetic Island.

The first day, <u>Friday</u>, we woke to a typical Queensland spring day with lovely sunshine and mild temperature. We left for a short trip around Storm King Dam, stopping for a picnic on the edge of the water at the tables and seats provided. We enjoyed catching up with friends not seen as much because of the problems the coronavirus has caused us. It was pleasant to see the dam at full capacity for the first time in a long while. During the drought they were trucking water in as the town supply was very low and dams were nearly empty. That afternoon our first happy hour was held in the camp kitchen at the Top of the Town Caravan Park where we were based. We finished off the evening with pizzas delivered to the camp kitchen.

<u>Saturday</u> was another lovely morning and we had a 50 kilometre round trip in front of us. We travelled sealed back roads to visit our choice of Suttons Juice Factory or Vincenzo Big Apple, which were on opposite sides of the highway, for morning tea. We then travelled on to Amiens township where we looked at the Soldier Settler display where veterans of the first world war were given parcels of land on their return. There is a railway carriage set up with a display explaining a lot about the settlement. We then backtracked to Amiens State School where we had a picnic lunch under the shade of the trees. Lunch over, we travelled back to base for another happy hour.

<u>Sunday</u> was a short 24 kilometres, leaving plenty of time for socialising, meeting new friends and renewing old friendships. We had our cars displayed on the road outside for about an hour, in front of the showground as it was market day there. Our back road trip took us to the Truffle Discovery Centre at Lawdogs. This place is the epicentre of many vineyards with cellar door sales and people look for a snack between wine tastes, but they also cater to many coach tours, so do very well despite the seeming isolation from everything. The atmosphere here with a wood fire in the corner happily warming patrons as they enjoyed the cuisine was luxurious. It was steady rain coming down as we left so most people were happy enough to return to the caravan park. The usual happy hour was conducted in the camp kitchen at 5 o'clock. Members catered their own dinner.

Our last day, Wednesday, it was still inclement, but a number of veterans still ventured out for the run to Wallangarra Railway Station a, round trip of 110 kilometres. Along the way we saw some interesting scenery, including a quite large stone pyramid, the result of clearing the land to make it useful for the farmer. There was a small amount of highway driving, but a route was taken through the Girraween National Park when the opportunity offered itself. Some of the hills provided a challenge for veteran cars, so many opted to go mostly on the highway on the way home. On arrival at the railway station we found we had to venture into NEW SOUTH WALES to get into the car park, but came back into Queensland as we walked onto the station. The state line runs diagonally across one end of the station. No problems! All OK. Their morning tea was scones, tarts and other goodies (again) which was consumed with enthusiasm. Most people checked out the station museum while there and marvelled at the different roof on each side of the verandah. New South Wales could not agree with Queensland, so there was a flat skillion for NSW and a bullnose on the Qld side. Even the railway lines have a different gauge for each state. On the way home most cars stopped at Ballandean Hotel for lunch then continued up the highway to Stanthorpe. Our farewell dinner was held at the Stanthorpe RSL, most going in the courtesy bus. 

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

Mon Repos is French for "My Rest" and was the name of the homestead established by Augustus Purling Barton in 1884. Barton was a pioneer of the Queensland sugar industry. The area was owned by the French Government between 1890 and 1925.



In the 1890s the Governments of France, Queensland & New South Wales decided to construct an undersea telegraph cable to link Australia to North America across the Pacific Ocean via New Caledonia, Fiji, Samoa and Hawaii. The cable came ashore at Mon Repos where a cable station was used until the 1920s when it was replaced by a radio service via Sydney and the cable station demolished. The cables remained in place under the sea where they were used during World War 2 by the Australian Navy to train crews in Midget submarines operating from HMS Bonaventure to cut cables in preparation to cut undersea telephone cables in Tokyo. Some remains of the cable can be seen within the former caravan park.
