

Veteran and Vintage Swap

The new restrictions were announced during the Veteran and Vintage Swap but fortunately we were working under a COVID-Safe Plan and therefore were exempt from the restrictions. As we don't have any attendance records for past swaps, it is hard to make any accurate judgments but most agreed that it was probably the best attended swap so far with thirty two stallholders registered and around 124 people on the grounds and there seemed to be a lot of bits changing hands. We do claim to be a gentleman's swap with advertised start time of 8.00 and most stallholders were on the grounds and setting up between 8 and 8.30. Trading was quite brisk and most I spoke to found something to take home. There were quite a number of people who helped out on the day but I must thank Albert, Russell and Hazel for their work in preparing for the event. I congratulate you all for your efforts.

CROWS NEST POST-CORONA LOCK DOWN RALLY REPORT

After watching the minimum temperatures for the last few days, it was time to pack a few more winter woollies and head for Crows Nest. With restrictions in place that limited private gatherings to 30 people in private houses or public spaces, as we were outside the Greater Brisbane Area, we had to develop a plan to make sure we were not in breach of that rule when travelling each day. The venues we were visiting, including our host, all had industry COVID Safer Plans in place, so we were exempt from this restriction but gatherings for morning tea and some other places of interest were not.

Staggered starts with the faster veterans and modern cars leaving first so they would clear the morning tea stop before the slower cars arrived proved a good solution. It also gave our lunch venues a better chance to serve people as they arrived without long delays.

After a few scratchings, mainly due to virus issues like border closures and other restrictions, we had 29 entries with 21 veterans and 8 modern or semi-modern. It was good to see a number of our new members joining us for the event.

Each day we travelled in a different direction although it is inevitable to find yourself on the same roads more than once. Travelling in different directions and the odd sleep in between meant it was still interesting. The bonus was that we hardly saw another vehicle on these quiet back roads and the scenery, while showing signs of drought, was still very pleasant.

Day one we travelled west through Goombungee for the first time, before heading to a park in Brymaroo for morning tea under the cover of a Canberra bomber. An interesting shelter with quite a story to tell. It was then onto a small place, which hardly rates a mention on any of the maps, for lunch. Kulpi, as it is called, was in a lovely spot for a lunch break overlooking the downs but we were soon on the road again with the option of a more challenging route for the larger cars. I'm not sure which route we took as our instructions were missing the last 2 pages, so we had to keep up with the car in front.

There were a few casualties today with most making it back on the road, the exception being Russell Massey's Vauxhall which decided it had had enough when it broke the water manifold which had only been repaired about 20 years earlier. Jenny Sorensen's newly imported 1915 Saxon roadster was having carby issues but managed to finish the rally. Alan Carpenter was nursing the Little but had to finish on the last day on the trailer and both Erik Larsen's T Ford and Ken Wells Renault were also not playing the game for much of the event.





The feature of day 2 was a visit to the Army Air Wing Museum at Oakey. It was a great display of military aircraft, including a box kite airplane similar to that flown by the Wright Brothers. Our host and tour guide was a most enthusiastic chap with the right combination of fact, humour and interesting stories to keep us all interested. Lunch was back in Goombungee before the short trip home.

The third and final day saw us first at Douglas Cemetery near, you guessed it, Goombungee. Here we were able to get an appreciation of the trials and tribulations of the early settlers by the inscriptions on the headstones. Ages ranging from the very young to a few quite old but the causes of death were very telling. Some took morning tea at the cemetery while others frequented the cafés in Goombungee. Lunch today was at the renowned Meringandan Hotel, a popular weekend venue for Toowoomba-ites looking for somewhere to lunch.

Back at home base preparations were being made for the Final Dinner at the onsite restaurant. The curtain raiser was the 50th Anniversary Premiere of the 1970 International Rally video as we had a number of members and a few cars that were on the event. Before dinner, our resident Sergeant at Arms, John Hanley exposed a few misdemeanours and the odd feat of heroism performed during the event and rewarded them with the assorted pieces of junk from his workshop. After a few hundred more rallies, John's workshop should be very tidy.

Finally there were the awards:

<u>Period_costume</u> was judged by the world renowned aficionado of fashion and decorum, Russell Massey with the prizes going to Barbara Clegg and Terry and Régie Lewis.

Longest distance travelled to Jenny Sorensen.

<u>Lady driver award</u> to Linda Arnold with me relegated to navigator for most of the rally. Probably accounts for the number of U turns required.

No hard luck prizes were awarded, instead there were two <u>Good Samaritan</u> Awards. One to Bill and Karen Ryan for helping to retrieve the Vauxhall and the other to Bob and Hazel Burley for assistance in retrieving the Little.

Last but not least were the thank-you's to Phil for the splendid organising for the event. I also had the honour of uniting Phil with the 100-year badge for his Hupmobile. The badge didn't come with the car but Greg Hill was able to get the Hoerlein family to part with it so it could go back on the car where it belongs. It was then time to head back out into the cold and home to bed to get ready for the pack-up in the morning and reflect on the most successful first club rally Post Corona Lockdown.

Thank you Phil and we look forward to the next event in Warwick 30th & 31st October and 1st November as long as there are no further restrictions.

Why Motorists' Day?

In towns and cities everywhere, the first motorists shared the streets with horse drawn vehicles. In Queensland they also shared the same traffic laws. You would be fined if you drove through intersections or around corners above 4 mph (horse speed), if you parked your vehicle at the kerb, with the engine turned off and the park brake applied and were at too great a distance from your vehicle or away from it for more than 15 minutes.

If the £2 fine was not paid, these motorists faced 7 days jail!

Recent research of Queensland newspapers, published over nine years, reveals that motorists were clearly discouraged from coming into towns.

This situation reached a peak with a case being heard every 2 minutes in the Brisbane traffic court. The Motorist's Club (now RACQ) could only warn motorists to be vigilant in observing these laws. In 1925, a deputation to the inspector of police, that included the RACQ president, the Maryborough Chamber of Commerce and others, could not resolve the issues.

In September 1926, Oswald Free, a hire car operator in Warwick, was the first person to enter a plea of 'not guilty' to the charge of leaving his vehicle unattended. With his hire car parked in front of the Langham Hotel, Oswald stayed there overnight to ensure his fare, also a guest at the hotel, met his early train.

Facing a potential fine of $\pounds 2$, he appeared with his garage proprietor, and successfully demonstrated to the court that with his car key in his pocket, he was in full control of his vehicle. The court resolved the matter with a nominal one shilling fine. This precedent finally ended motorists being prosecuted under laws written for horse drawn vehicles.

COVID-19 'VCCQ's Queensland Motorists' Day Re-enactment Run'


26 & 27th September 2020— Esk to Warwick, Queensland

Syd and Pauline discovered the following, which they thought might be of interest to members to have a look at. There are a number of coffee shops nearby.

Constantine's Bell

Although the Roman Emperor Constantine lived so many centuries ago, in the early years of the 300's, over 1,600 years ago, we have here in Brisbane an actual connection with Constantine the Great himself.

In a special iron framework at the side entrance of St Augustine's Anglican Church, at number 9 Charlton Street in the suburb of Hamilton, Brisbane, hangs a heavily tarnished brass bell. But it is more than just an old bell, as it is thought to be the oldest bell in the world.

Embossed with figures of Christ the King, the Virgin Mary and the Infant Jesus, the history of this bell shows that it was first hung in a Church in what is now Romania, by the Roman Emperor Constantine, in 320 A.D. but twelve years after he had granted liberty of worship to the Christian population.

This bell called Christians to worship until 1410 A.D. when the area was overrun by the Turks. The Church then became a Mahommedan (sic) Mosque, and the bell continued to call the faithful to prayer to Allah until 1918 when World War I made the area a battleground once again. The Mosque was destroyed in the fighting as Allied Troops occupied the town. Embers of a British Regiment rescued the bell from amongst the ruins, taking it to the Bulgarian port of Varna on the Black Sea coast. They buried it there in the sand, intending to salvage it later and take it to England.



However they had not reckoned with the crew of the Australian ship, the "Melra"*, whose members souvenired the bell and smuggled it on board their ship, intending to present it to their Captain, William Campbell Thomson of Brisbane. The bell travelled to Sydney as ballast, but on arrival it was confiscated by the Customs officials. The Marine Superintendant of the Shipping Line, Captain H. Tyrer, intervened, and the crew was allowed to give the bell to Captain Thomson.

Believing that the bell was too valuable to lie in his private collection, Captain Thomson handed it over to the authorities of the Church of England, who decided that the bell should hang as a War Memorial at St Augustine's, and once again it called the faithful to prayer.

Progress finally caught up with the old bell when a new bell tower was built as an RAAF Memorial. The old bell was retired in favour of a new, louder, electronically operated bell installed in 1967, and Constantine's Bell was erected in the special framework where it now stands.

Ironically the last time the old bell was rung was during the disastrous 1974 flood, when the electrical system of the new bell was put out of order by the heavy rains.

Constantine the Great died on May 22, 337 A.D. and was buried in the Church of the Twelve Apostles at Constantinople, now Istanbul.
